ROTARY CONTAINER SHIPPED TO TANZANIA

At 7 am 1st April the huge 40 ft container acquired by Southport Rotary started its journey from the Gold Coast to Prince of Peace School near the Amani Centre, Tanzania – stacked full with essential and useful items. The photos show coordinator Andrew Middleton with fellow Rotarian Greg Dux about to close the doors and the striking container moving off.

The contents include desks, chairs, cabinets, tools and about 40 computers. Lloyd Fleming, a Sunnybank parishioner and Rotarian, obtained the computers from the charity *Be a Hero Australia* then added software. A last minute donation came from the Springbrook Craft Group - quilts and knitted jumpers. (This was arranged by ex Sunnybank parishioner Annette Robbins when she heard of the shipment to Fr John on Gold Coast local radio).

With bountiful rain comes abundant grass growth and opportunity to feed more cattle. The dairy herd has been increased through funds from the USA. There is also a short term opportunity to grow and sell beef weaners on this free feed (cost is about 85 Aussie dollars; selling for maybe five times as much).

A BIGGER BUS

Not too long ago we were pleased to be able to obtain a bus to transport children to school – but it is a small bus and student numbers have grown.

Fr John reports

"The increase in numbers has strained the ability of our Toyota bus to meet the demand. It is overcrowded. This situation certainly affects enrolments. Many parents at Mvumi Mission say they will not send their children until we have a larger bus. We simply cannot continue as we are. The solution is to (a) replace the present bus with a much larger vehicle or, (b) to retain the present bus and add a larger, medium size bus, a step up from the present one."

Going with option (b), Fr John has estimated that a 42 seater bus will cost over \$46 000 (AUD) (including purchase, insurance, roadworthy inspection). He adds "I do emphasize that this is an



urgent need. I appeal to all friends to give this need urgent consideration".
