
**Gift Emanuel Patrick** is 11 years old, a Standard Five student at Makang'wa Primary School. He lives with his grandparents. The old couple are local subsistence farmers. Gift has one brother and two sisters. As you can see, he is a bright lad, open and confident in his manner. His favourite food is rice. In this culture that is a food for celebrations. His favourite sport is football (soccer). What else would an African lad play? At school he loves Geography, Science, Civics and Mathematics. Yes, Gift is a bright lad and a joy to his grandparents.

**Anitha Mchali** is 11 years of age, with a brother and a sister. She lives with her mother. The father has left the home. Her mother is a subsistence farmer. This is a difficult time for the home as food is expensive now and in short supply. Anitha is in Standard Five at Makang'wa Primary School. She is a patriotic Tanzania. Her favourite food is UGALI! She enjoys playing netball. Her favourite subjects are Geography and Mathematics.




**Furaha Silla** is eleven years, with one brother and two sisters. She lives with her parents. Her father is the newly appointed Pastor of St. John's Church. This means that the family is quite poor! She is in Standard Five at Makang'wa Primary. Her favourite food is Ugali. Her favourite sport is netball. Furaha and Anitha must get along well as Furaha also likes Geography and Mathematics. 'Furaha' means 'happy' in Swahili.





Nice Frederick Yohana is fourteen years old and in Standard Five at Makang'wa Primary. His age indicates that there was some problem in the family which delayed his schooling. Nice has two brothers and two sisters. He lives with his mother. The father has deserted the family. He says his favourite food is 'wali', which is Swahili for rice. Nice loves to play football. His best subjects at school are Science and Geography.

Baraka Lameck Paul is also a fourteen year old lad, in Standard Six at Makang'wa Primary. Baraka has two brothers and one sister. He lives with his mother, a single parent. His mother is also a subsistence farmer. (I greatly admire the manner in which these women care for their families in the midst of so much daily need.) Baraka loves to eat ugali. His favourite sport is football. His favourite subjects at school are Mathematics, English and Science.



Selina Wilfred Makalanzi is the Leader of the Primary Section of Children of Peace. Selina has been doing this wonderful work for ten years! She is also now the Deanery Children's Ministry Organizer. She is married to Wilfred, who is an Evangelist, working in many places around Tanzania. They have one daughter and four boys. Apart from her work with the children Selina is a farmer. Wilfred is frequently away for extended periods.

Selina is one of the most effective children's work leaders I have known. There can be over two hundred children in the hall and I have never heard her raise her voice. She loves the children, and they KNOW it.

We do need your continuing support. We did mention in the October Newsletter that the sponsorship is no longer directed to a particular child but to the support of the entire work of assisting the children in the areas of education, clothing, health and general care.
